F <u>ruitful</u> (Genesis 1:28) R <u>eciprocal</u> (Proverbs 4:23; Jeremiah 17:9; 1 John 4:7-8)		 Fruitful: Friendship with one's spouse, like everything else, exists to glorify God and serve His Kingdom. Reciprocal: When both spouses make a deep heartfelt covenant with God to continually seek to become a better friend, the marriage is marked by increasing love and longing with both spouses. Intimate: Deep friendships get beyond facts and opinions to the sharing of how we truly
I <u>ntimate</u> (Genesis 32:30; Exodus 33:11; Judges 6:22; 1 Corinthians 13:12) E <u>njoyable</u> (Ecclesiastes 9:7-9)		 feel. Lifelong friends need to be transparent and vulnerable with each other. Enjoyable: A friendship with an enjoyable spouse can make a world of difference. Any couple that hopes to exit this life still holding hands must be friends who have fun along the way. Needed: We need human friendships in addition to friendship with God. The more a husband's panel for his wife and a wife's panel for her husband are salebrated as grasinus gifts.

Devoted: Proverbs 17:17 says, "A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for adversity."
