Community Group Questions

Discussion Questions

1. READ MARK 10:35-45 AND JOHN 13:1-8. What is God saying to you in this passage? What do you sense you need to do about it?
2. When was the last time you had a conversation with someone who seemed to have an ulterior motive? How did you know they had ulterior motives?
3. Are you comfortable sharing your story and telling people about the impact Jesus has had on your life? When was the last time you shared your story? How did the person you shared with respond?
4. "We don't love our neighbors to convert them; we love our neighbors because we're converted." Discuss how this statement brings both relief and tension.
5. Which of your "nearest ones" do you feel God calling you to spend more time with? What will this cost you? What are some practical ways you can remain motivated to continue loving them?

RESPOND

1. Tell a friend from your community group your story of how Jesus has impacted you. Ask them for feedback (Did I use everyday language that made sense—not "churchy" words? Was the gospel clear—sin, Jesus' death & resurrection, faith?)
2. Ask someone in your neighborhood for their advice on something you're needing help. Listen to them or accept their help and see this as an opportunity to be a recipient of love.
3. Begin talking with some of your neighbors on planning a party together. This could be anything that would bring you and others that may be "strangers" in your neighborhood together to get to know one another.
